

### WHAT MAKES A GREAT COMMUNITY

A community is generally thought to be a group of people who have common characteristics or interests. They can be defined by many things, including geographic location, race, ethnicity, occupation, or shared interest or affinity. Scarboro's status as a community is both historic and geographic. But its standing as a community runs deeper than mere geography or even history. Our community is about our shared affinity for what this community has to offer, whether big trees, wide streets, character homes, historic parks, or simply the look and feel of a small residential enclave nestled with the downtown core of Calgary. Scarboro is also about a shared sense of belonging.

But Scarboro is not just an ordinary, run-of-the-mill community; it's a great one. Its greatness lies in part in its historic origins as one of the early communities of a then young Calgary. Its physical charm and beauty owe much to its architectural significance as a community designed by the Olmsted design firm, the famous landscape architectural firm perhaps best known for Central Park in New York City. There is at least one other attribute of Scarboro that makes it a great community and that is its traditions for volunteerism and community involvement. Scarboro evokes a strong sense of pride and community spirit. Its greatness has firmly taken root in the activities and initiatives that we have built together over the years.

Many of you have long, multi-generational, connections to Scarboro. Mine is more recent but, nonetheless, deep. My first introduction to Scarboro came in the fall of 2006. I lived in Edmonton at the time but was being toured around Calgary by my now spouse, a life-long Calgary resident. As we drove up the hill into the community, he remarked that this was the place that he dreamed of living. Less than a year later, we were the proud owners of a home in Scarboro. I have spent more time buying a pair of shoes than I did that day in May 2007 when we bought the house. I must have sensed the community pride that permeates everything that happens in Scarboro. Within a few weeks of moving in, I discovered that a childhood friend from Ottawa lived six doors away, and that my neighbors included three law school classmates from Halifax. I very quickly came to see that living in Scarboro was a bit like living in an episode of The Waltons, a 1970's television drama that exuded family values and the duties and responsibilities flowing from membership in a family or other community.

In this my first message to you as the President of our Community Association, I want to pay tribute to the scores of volunteers who help make this such a strong and vibrant community: a great community. Stay tuned to future editions of the Newsletter when I plan to introduce you to all these volunteers! First, let me express our collective thanks to Sharon Nettleton, for her tireless efforts over the past two years as our President. I also want to acknowledge and thank the other members of the Board of Directors: Karen Abernathy, our Treasurer, Kristen Clarke, our Secretary, and to other Directors, Karin Gashus; Brent Fraser, Peter Strickland and Faisal Alimohd. Please join me in welcoming to the Board, Pete Dennis, Chair of our Planning Committee; Susan Anderson Olney, Board Liaison to the volunteers who are involved in communication activities, including the newsletter and our website; Ron Evans, Board Liaison to the volunteers who support the Scarboro Community Hall; and Kristin Slana, Board Liaison to the various events and activities sponsored by the Association. In addition to the members of the Board, I also want to acknowledge and pay tribute to the scores of other volunteers who donate their time and energy to making this a great community.

Like every community, Scarboro is constantly changing as we say goodbye to old friends and welcome new ones. A particular word of welcome to our many new neighbors and friends at Scarboro 17.

All communities, even great ones, are a "work in progress". They require on-going renewal. Our community is no different. It requires constant care and attention. To keep our community vibrant and strong, our need to expand our group of volunteers is continuous. Our volunteers, past and present lie at the heart of the legacy of community involvement that has been such an important part of becoming a great community. As I write this piece in late November, there are still a few gaps in the network of volunteers that we need to sustain the work of our community association. 
This year we are excited to welcome Erika Gombos and Atilla Murkl onto the Landscape Committee from Scarboro 17 and as well Lesley Morden who moved into the community this year. We look forward to working on ongoing joint projects to green and clean up the area. We have identified 9 fun projects over the next three years that require attention, and here they are:

- 1. Work with the City's Urban Canopy team on tree pruning and general management of streets and parks.
- 2. Build a community garden beside Ward Park in conjunction with Scarboro 17.
- 3. Engage with residents on tree support on sidewalks outside their homes, maintaining healthy canopies including pruning, disease control etc.
- 4. Clean up Ward Park and create an inviting area in conjunction with Calgary Parks and Roads.
- 5. Obtain a grant and complete last 2 Scarboro park signs.
- 6. Support the orchard on Summit, including community apple and pear baking days!
- 7. Work with Reader Rock Garden on historic plantings around the area.
- 8. Clean up hall beds and plant heritage beds.
- 9. Review and discuss Adopt a Park program with the City.

Anyone interested in heritage gardening, building a community garden in conjunction with Scarboro 17 or a bit of pruning and landscaping, please feel free to join us! Stay tuned for one-day events to get out with fellow neighbours and get your hands dirty!

We also have grants to apply for and various ongoing discussion with City departments around adopting parks, obtaining free items such as mulch and plants, so not all the work requires gloves! If you have an interest in landscape and gardening grants, we could certainly use some assistance in that area as well.

Thank you to Pritha Kalar for also making herself available and a special thanks to Glynn Wright who retired this year, but not before decades of volunteering for our community.

The Mulloy name has been associated with one of Scarboro's very central and quaint homes for 65 years. The white and blue 'Cape Cod' style home has retained its heritage character over the years. It can be found at the 5-way intersection across from Triangle Park.

When the house became the home of the Mulloy family, Dr. Bill Mulloy was a young practicing family doctor with an office close by on 17th Ave. He met and married Anne Mulloy (nee Cowan) in 1957. Anne was originally from Sarnia, Ontario. She loved all the charm and beauty of Scarboro - it likely reminded her of the 'small town' character where she grew up and especially the closeness to nature. After graduating from nursing at the University of Toronto in 1953, Anne and a friend embarked on a 'big adventure' and drove from Toronto to Calgary. They stayed first in a Calgary hostel and soon after, rented an upstairs suite in Mrs. Cole's home at 336 Sharon Ave. The location couldn't have been better. Tennis courts were only a block away and Anne remembers skating rinks and most of all, she could walk to work. One of her first placements as a Calgary Public Health Nurse was at the Scarboro Health Clinic (or as it was often referred to 'the Baby Clinic') on Scotland St.

(the former Fire Station). Working there at the same time as a nurse was the sister of Dr. Bill Mulloy, Mary Mulloy. After skating one night Mary and Anne went back to Mary's family home for hot chocolate. It was there Anne met Mary's brother, Bill. It may have been a 'set-up', and if so, obviously successful. Bill invited Anne to the Calgary Medical Ball. Other dates followed and then an engagement and wedding (August 17, 1957).

Anne and Bill bought their Sunderland Avenue home in 1959. Prior to owning, they rented an apartment (now called the 'Artemis') near the Scout Hall in Bankview. A year later they rented a home in Scarboro at 326 Superior. Their first two sons were born while they lived in this house. When the house at 312 Sunderland Avenue came up for sale, Anne remembers moving quickly to see if they could purchase it. The purchase went through, and 312 Sunderland Avenue was where they would establish their Scarboro roots. Anne remembers moving small items between the houses in the baby buggy. Four boys were raised here – with many memories of their own and connections and friends made through schools (Sunalta and Western High). Many of these friendships remain today.

Anne loved to cook and share meals in the house. There were always friends, relatives, neighbours coming and going. Birthdays, graduations and especially Christmas dinners were celebrated around the dining room table. Then came along marriages and the births and visits of grandchildren. A few things remained constant over the years: Dogs (and sometimes even strays) were always present and welcome at the Mulloys. They were usually invited into all rooms of the house. The chaos and cleaning was extraordinary. Anne is still remembered in the neighbourhood for her endless walks with her dog Jenny and stopping to visit with everyone along the way.



In 2013, Anne and Bill moved to a senior's residence. Shortly thereafter, the Mulloy family home was purchased by one of the sons, keeping the name 'Mulloy' part of this home in the community of Scarboro today. One of Anne's pride and joys was bringing two silver maple samplings from her old home in Sarnia and planting them at 312 Sunderland. They still tower over the house today.

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### INGREDIENTS:

3/4 cup shortening
1 cup white sugar
1 egg
4 tbsp molasses
2 cups flour
1 tsp salt
2 tsp baking powder
2 tsp baking soda
1 tsp ground cloves
1 tsp ground cinnamon
1 tsp ground ginger

#### DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350F

Cream first two ingredients, add egg and blend well.
Stir in molasses. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well.
Roll into 1 inch balls and roll in granulated sugar.
Press with a fork or a glass.

Place on parchment paper lined cookie sheet. Bake for 10 minutes. Cool & Enjoy!

### **HERITAGE MATTERS: Demystifying Heritage**

The Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources is a list of sites that have been identified as possessing significant heritage value, and whose preservation is considered to be to the greater benefit of Calgarians.

Inclusion on the Inventory is a formal acknowledgement of heritage value, and in most cases does not extend legal protection to the property, nor does it regulate the property. It is, however, the first step toward obtaining legal designation if a property owner wishes to pursue that.

Municipal legal designation falls under the purview of the City of Calgary and is managed through municipal bylaw. Legal designation includes the character defining elements of a particular site that are considered to be of heritage value. It prevents the demolition of a building and guides the property owner as to how to make sympathetic alteration. In exchange for agreeing to protect character defining elements, property owners may be eligible to receive incentives, and/or grant funding to assist in the restoration, rehabilitation, or preservation of the property.
